

Díd you Know?

Let me ask you a question. Give thoughtful consideration before you present your answer. The question is this: If we had to forgo the celebration of Christmas, Good Friday, Easter, or Pentecost, which one would seem the least crucial? Take your time. Most, me included, would have a tough time picturing a year with no Christmas, no Holy Thursday/Good Friday, or no Easter, all of which we just celebrated this church year so far.

Many Christians, because of the congregational and cultural emphasis of the first three, would say, "Well, if I must choose, I can do without Pentecost." I would say: "Absolutely not!" The bottom line of what I am trying to say from the Bible in Acts 2 is that without Pentecost the other three celebrations would not be celebrated at all!

There could not have been a Good Friday without the advent of Christ's coming which we celebrate at Christmas. Good Friday, as we remembered via our Stations of the Cross, would have been a meaningless martyrdom without the victorious resurrection of Jesus Christ which we celebrate at Easter.



But it is Pentecost that enables the gift of faith by which you and I can know that the birth, the death, and the resurrection of Jesus Christ are for us! Jesus was not finished when He rose from the dead and ascended to be with His Father and glorified. He came back to give the greatest gift of all -- the gift of His own Spirit to live in us.

It is with the excitement of this reality that we focus in June on Pentecost. Wear Red to church on June 8th to symbolize the Fire or Flame of the Spirit upon us.

Knightsville Methodist Church has members who have experienced a renewed sense of purpose and inspiration in their lives from the Holy Spirit. Let us continue to display that Spirit in the months to come.


New Adult Sunday School class.... Abundant Life

Meet the Mustard Seeds

These beautiful young humans sing in the Mustard Seeds choir. They arrive in the sanctuary after the Traditional Service each week and spend 25 minutes learning all types of Christian songs - from old-fashioned hymns to spirituals to some of the latest contemporary Christian music they hear on the radio.

There have been a few changes since regrouping and starting earlier this year (2024/2025) in September/October. Originally our time was from 10:10am to 10:25am each week, but most everyone is now coming in earlier. These guys come in from 10am-10:30am because they are having such a great time not only learning new music, but they are developing closer relationships with each other.

Each week, we begin by practicing the songs they are adding to their rehearsal list, then we (typically) take the last few minutes to talk about what is on their mind and/or what has happened in their lives that week. They are also given the chance to "vote" on the songs they enjoy most and want to perform next - majority rule! We end each practice/rehearsal with "Shalom Chaverim" (Peace Be With You) which is also our ending prayer. This has become our favorite of any of the songs we perform.














Out of the Shadows "I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end He will stand upon the earth." ~ Job 19:25

The year 1741 was a very depressing one for George Frideric Handel. His latest opera failed. His Italian opera company in London disbanded. That same year Queen Caroline passed away and the commissions Handel had received for composing music for royal occasions all but dried up. A stroke experienced several years prior not only affected Handel physically, but affected his music also. It seemed as if he had lost the genius that made his music so popular.

Late that year Charles Jennens, a poet known by few, sent Handel a manuscript with a request that Handel set it to music. When Handel read the copy, the words gripped him. Suddenly he came alive! Immediately he began to put the words to music. He labored all through that night and much of the following day. In fact, he worked day and night for 22 more days, barely stopping to eat or sleep.

When his composition was finished, he sensed that it would be a true masterpiece. His Messiah was performed the following year and was an immediate success.

The words that Jennens wrote that inspired Handel and lifted him out of the pit of despair were about the Savior: "He was despised and rejected by men. He looked for someone to have pity on him, but there was no man. He trusted in God. God did not leave his soul in hell. I know that my Redeemer lives. Rejoice. Hallelujah!"

If you are in a time of despair or just a bit stressed out because of a life situation, the Stephen Ministry can help. We can listen. We can pray with you. We cannot solve your problem, but we can "be there" for you and support you as you work to resolve whatever it is that life has thrown at you.

Holy Spirit Moments

"They crucified my Lord, and he never said a mumblin' word. They nailed him to a tree, and he never said a mumblin' word. They pierced him in the side, and he never said a mumblin' word. Not a word! Not a word? Not a single word." Last night, I did something that I have never done in sixty-two years of life on this earth. I went to a Good Friday service at my church that was a presentation of the "Way of the Cross", a modern adaptation of an old Christian tradition that goes back to the fifth-century. Those in attendance participate in "carrying the cross" for Jesus along the Via Dolorosa or "sorrowful way" believed to be the route in Jerusalem that Jesus took on his way to the crucifixion. The Way of the Cross is marked by 14 significant stations representing events that occurred on that Good Friday when Jesus was tortured and hung on a cross to die.

The service last evening began with the choir singing "He never Said a Mumbin' Word" the old Negro spiritual in a haunting A cappella style that fell over the hushed crowd of those in attendance. You could feel the agony that must have been in the hearts of the women who followed Jesus after watching him die a torturous death on that cross, and knowing that there was nothing they could do to help Him.

From that point on, I solemnly watched as volunteers took up the cross to travel the way to the first station. This station remembered when Jesus was condemned to death by Pilate. As the first group of volunteers hoisted the cross onto their shoulders I pondered that at just this moment, an innocent man, blameless and without sin had just been condemned to death by crucifixion to the shouts of "crucify him, crucify him" coming from the same people who had proclaimed him as King just 5 days earlier as he entered the city to the waving of palm branches and shouts of "Hosanna." I can hear Pilate, frustratingly say to the assembly of elders and chief priests that after examining the evidence he cannot see any reason to condemn Jesus to die on a cross, but I can also see and hear the crowd shouting over and over, "Crucify Him, Crucify Him!" And then Pilate complies with their wishes, giving his verdict and directions for the guards to proceed. But with all of that, what impacted me the most at that moment was the knowledge that Jesus knew that this moment was coming. I felt a pain and emptiness that is hard to describe, knowing that I, like the disciples who would deny knowing Jesus in the moments after his arrest and crucifixion, was responsible for hurting Jesus that day. I have offended Him and grieved Him on so many occasions with my words and actions, my contempt for others.

I was jolted back to the moment, in the field outside of my church, as the choir sang "Were you there, when they crucified my Lord." As the choir finished the verse, the cross arrived at the second stopping point. It was a stop to reflect on how Jesus must have felt, knowing that his compassion and love for humanity had been cast off as a crowd of people who had been worked into a frenzy by political wrangling and shenanigans contributed to a movement to repay his goodness and mercy with torture and death. My mind went away from the field to some corner in Jerusalem and I saw Jesus pause to pray and I heard those lining the way jeering at him, spitting at him. Accusing him of things he could never do.

As another group of volunteers, offered to carry the cross, this time in silence there was no singing, I watched, seeing Jesus in my mind's eye, not my fellow church members, carry that cross to the 3rd station. I saw Jesus, stumble and fall and I caught a glimpse of some of the Jewish leaders and members of the Sanhedrin who had angrily sought to kill Jesus as they denied His claims to be the Son of Man, I saw them watching as Jesus stumbled and fell to the ground and I noticed a couple looked away, so as to not humanize their part in this dreadful scene that was playing out. But mainly, I saw them as proud and accomplished, feeling as if they had exterminated another threat to their power and influence. Again, the silence as the cross arrived at this third-station brought me back to Good Friday 2025 and a prayer to Jesus to grant us strength to deal with the pain we feel when we are betrayed. Yet, we struggle to forgive those who betray us, Jesus freely forgave them, those who were torturing him.

On the way to the fourth station, and back to my mystical experience, I see Jesus' mother Mary and at that very moment, His eyes meet her eyes. My heart is strangled by the pain and suffering I see on Mary's face as she fights back tears that just won't relent. And I see pain, returning to her pain, from Jesus as he looks upon her with compassion and love. The choir sings, "sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble. Were you there, when they crucified my Lord." And I feel pain for Mary, as I remember images of her smiling down with tears of Joy at that babe in the manger, knowing the unequaled love of a mother, I hurt for her.

As a handful of additional volunteers hoist the cross on their shoulders for the short walk to the fifth station, I see Simon of Cyrene, who was traveling to Jerusalem for the Passover, as he is pulled out of the crowd by the Roman Guards and forced to carry the cross a portion of the way up the hill. I realize, they are not wanting to relieve Jesus of the weight of the cross, no not at all, they simply do not want him to die before they have a chance to torture him some more. I watch as Jesus stumbles along in front of Cyrus toward the hilltop. I would expect the crowd to have begun to have some feelings of remorse seeing Jesus in such poor state, but no, not at all. They were still mocking him and spitting on him. He could have replied back to them, but not a word. I notice periodically he stops, and I can tell he is praying. But the prodding continues. In silence new volunteers lift the cross and begin toward the seventh station. I noticed that the "crown of thorns" that the guards had placed upon his head was gouging into his skin and I imagined the stinging and burning that his eyes must be feeling as they were flooded with this mixture. Along the way, I see a compassion filled woman emerge from the crowd. She has a cloth and she stops Jesus to wipe the blood, sweat and tears from His face. What really strikes me about this act of compassion is that the woman realized, "this is all that I can do" and she didn't hesitate, even though her own life could have been in danger. I wonder to myself, "what can I do?" It hits me hard, realizing that I would possibly have kept the cloth in my pocket.

At the next station, the eighth station, I see Jesus after falling to the ground for a second time, pick himself up and continue to trudge along His way. For the first time, I glance ahead and I see a group of women gathered along the way. They are weeping uncontrollably as they see Jesus struggling step by step and when he falls for a third time, they gasp and a couple of them fall to the

ground, themselves exhausted and overcome with grief. By the time the cross reaches the ninth station, I too am becoming to feel a sense of heavy grief. And then I hear Jesus, straining for the strength to speak as he says to the women, "Do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and your children." At this station, there was no singing but I listened as the reader at the station prayed, "Lord Jesus, I weep for the sorrows that I have caused in my life and for the offenses I have committed against God. Suddenly, I was moved to a place deep within myself and for a moment I was consumed with remorse for things I have said and done. Sixty-two years of life sped past the pre-frontal cortex of my brain as I relived and regretted so much. I remember the story from earlier in the week when Jesus descended the hill toward the city gates of Jerusalem, knowing that even though the city was buzzing with joy and anticipation for the coming Messiah he knew and now we know, how the week would go. But I remember the words from Luke 19:42 when Jesus upon seeing the city, pondered the plight of the city and the people as he cried out, "Oh Jerusalem, if you, even you had only known on this day what would bring you peace, but now it is hidden from your eyes." And I realize, He could just as easily be saying, "Oh Doug, if you, even you had only known on this day what would bring you peace." And I hurt deeply knowing that I fall short, every day and that because of my shortcomings, He had to do all of this for me. At the same time, I begin to fear for those who don't hear the gospel, who deny parts of Holy Scripture or live their lives in a way that does not emphasize authentic faith but in a manner that emphasizes their own desires, pleasures, actions and possessions. I not only feel remorse for my own behavior but at this moment I worry significantly about a world full of people who as William Wilberforce says in his book Real Christianity, live their lives in a manner that "if the truth were to be told, they probably think that Christianity is a future reward in Heaven that they (and those they love) receive in return for having endured certain religious expectations here on earth."

This station really impacts me in an extremely sorrowful way. I feel myself standing in place as the rest of those in attendance follow along behind the children who are now carrying the cross to the tenth station. Upon arriving at the tenth station, once again my mind travels back to that morning in Jerusalem and I hear the sickening thud of the hammer as it strikes the nails that are piercing Jesus hands and feet and I watch in anguish as they raise the pole into the sky. The words I hear my good friend and fellow choir member Tony sing, brings me back to that field beside the church on Good Friday 2025 "Were you there when they nailed him to the tree?"

At the eleventh station, I see Jesus high above the ground on a cross, in obvious pain and suffering a plight that I can not imagine, ministering to a criminal. Here is the Son of Man, absent of sin, full of righteousness and suffering from the worst punishment ever laid out upon an innocent man and he is putting the soul of a criminal first with an act of mercy and grace resulting in the criminal's sins being wholly forgiven. As the speaker begins to pray, I am reminded of how often I am so focused on my pain and plight that I forget to take care of others. That one hits home. I reflect and question myself, what is in my heart? Do I act out of atonement or out of attainment. Am I working for God's will be done or do I have my own agenda?

As more children from the church scramble to be a part of the bearing of the cross and the cross arrives at the twelfth station, I see Jesus most beloved, John standing in the crowd beside Jesus' mother Mary. I see her grief and pain and once again it causes my heart to hurt. I can imagine Michelle, my wife, if she were to have to watch, God forbid, one of her son's tortured and beaten in this brutal fashion. And I watch John, as he surveys what his teacher and Rabbi is having to endure. He reflects on the time that he, along with his brother James, asked to be seated at the side of Jesus as He ushered in His Kingdom and he remember Jesus asking, "Can you drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized." Then I hear Jesus say to John and Mary, "Behold your mother and woman behold your son" as he transferred care of His mother to John, his beloved.

Moving once again, I follow the cross to the thirteenth station. Strangely though, I still cannot get over the sorrow that I felt back at the ninth station when I realized the gravity of the pain that I have caused Jesus and the Holy Spirit with my life and actions. However, I am once again transported to a place on Calvary that day when I hear the Roman Soldiers casting lots for Jesus' garments. Then almost instantaneously, I hear and feel Jesus cry out from the cross in His last agonizing breath, "It is done!" At first I think he means that his pain and suffering is done, that he has died. But then I realize it is much bigger than that. IT IS DONE. My sins are forgiven, His Mercy Saved Me. And strangely the remorse that I began to feel earlier when my life's failures flashed before my eyes is replaced with new life. Life that tells me, "I did it for you because I know you can't do it for yourself, now follow me!"

I don't really remember much about the experience after that. But as I sit here on Holy Saturday writing this, I know that Sunday is coming and what a glorious day it will be. Thank you, Jesus. Thank you.
